Central theme

1. How this map is read

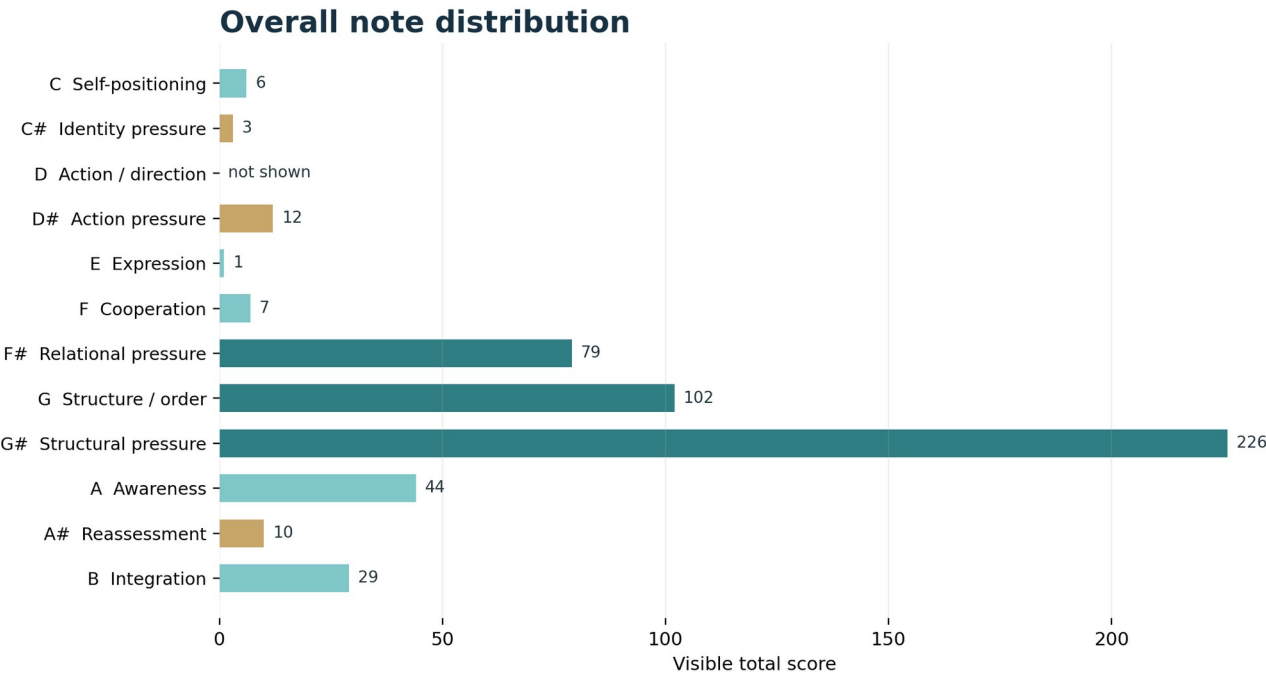


Figure 1. Overall visible score distribution across the twelve note functions.

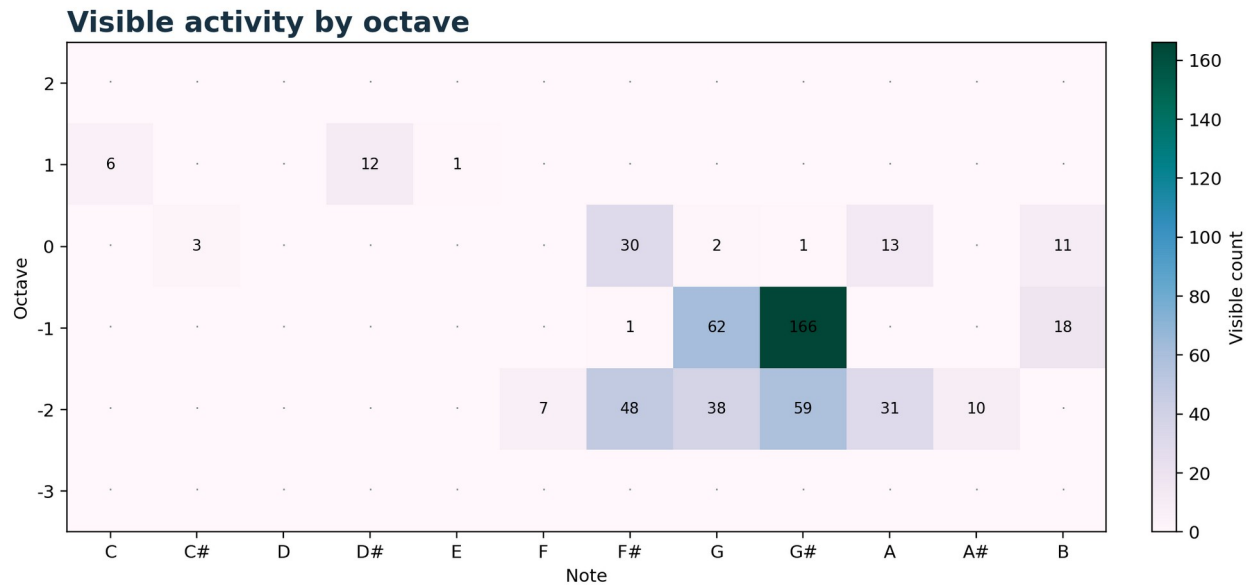


Figure 2. Visible activity by octave and note.

2. Dominant pattern: structure under pressure

G# is more than twice G and far above every other note. The central issue is therefore not simply an interest in organization. It is pressure on organization: the sense that routines, institutions, rules, leadership, or resource systems are failing, unstable, or in need of correction. In a discussion about Canadian politics, this can appear as close attention to governance, institutional competence, public systems, and whether decision-makers are maintaining order effectively.

Balanced expression

- Can identify where systems are breaking down.
- Values consistency, accountability, and workable structure.
- May be strong at spotting waste, contradiction, or weak implementation.
- Can separate policy intention from practical function.

Pressured expression

- May become rigid or preoccupied with correction.

The G / G# imbalance

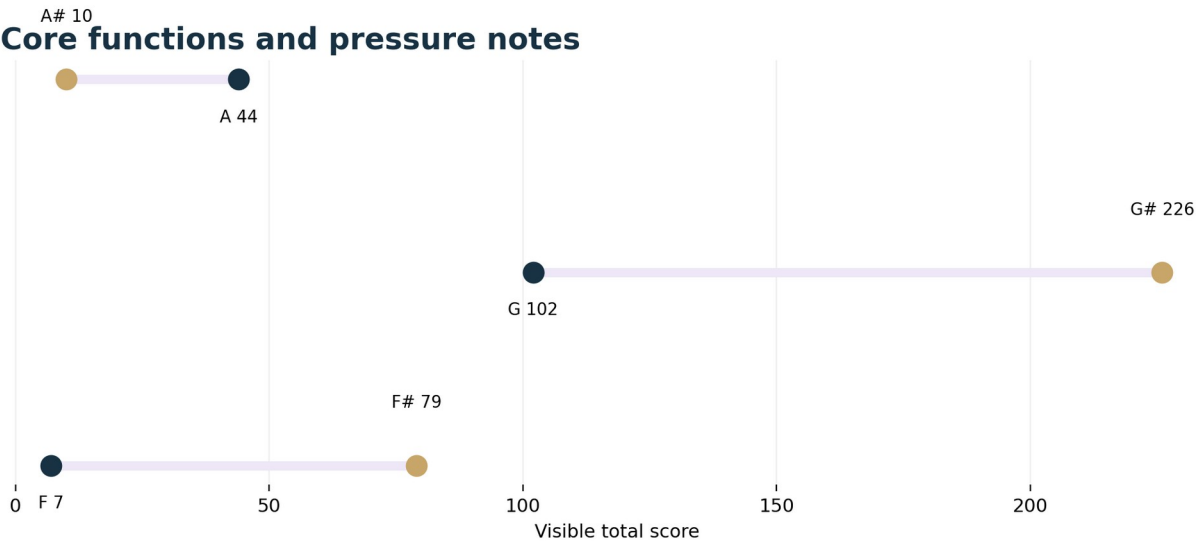


Figure 3. Natural functions compared with their related pressure notes.

Stable structure is active, but corrective pressure is substantially stronger. This suggests the person is not merely seeking order; they are responding to a perceived failure of order. The distinction matters. When balanced, this produces reform-oriented thinking. When pressured, it can produce chronic vigilance, control attempts, or difficulty tolerating slow institutional change.

Communication style

Expression (E) is very low compared with structure and pressure. This suggests the person may not primarily process politics through emotional disclosure or personal storytelling. They may communicate by identifying flaws, inconsistencies, operational failures, or what should be changed. Others may experience this as analytical, firm, or corrective rather than openly emotional.

Working with others

F# is much stronger than F, indicating pressure around cooperation or compromise. In political discussion, compromise may be experienced as necessary but strained. The person may cooperate when the structure is clear and the standards are credible, but resist arrangements that feel inconsistent, vague, or unfairly distributed.

- Likely to respond well to evidence, process, and clear definitions.
- Less likely to be persuaded by emotional pressure alone.
- May become frustrated when others argue from identity rather than function.
- May need to slow down before treating disagreement as incompetence or bad faith.

Best communication approach

The most productive exchange is concrete: define the problem, separate facts from interpretation, identify the decision-maker, and specify what a workable correction would look like. Abstract outrage is likely to intensify the pattern; operational clarity is more likely to settle it.

4. Stress, reliability, compromise, and possible deceptive signals

Under stress

Stress is likely to increase monitoring and correction rather than withdrawal. The person may scan for inconsistencies, tighten standards, or become more focused on what is wrong with the system. Because awareness and integration are present but not dominant, the person may notice a problem quickly and then stay with the corrective frame before fully integrating alternative explanations.

Compromise

Compromise is most likely to succeed when it preserves structure and accountability. Vague appeals to unity may not be enough. The person is more likely to accept trade-offs when the costs, safeguards, and review process are explicit.

Possible deception-like signals - not proof of deception

This profile cannot determine dishonesty. Under pressure, strong structural correction can resemble certainty, rigid framing, selective emphasis on system failures, or treating assumptions as established facts. These signals can also reflect sincere concern, analytical focus, or frustration. The appropriate response is to ask for sources, timelines, and the specific chain between evidence and conclusion.

5. Practical development plan

DEFINE	State the exact system or policy problem before discussing motive or blame.
SEPARATE	Distinguish structural failure, political disagreement, and ordinary implementation limits.
VERIFY	Use primary facts, dates, and direct sources before reinforcing the corrective conclusion.
SCALE	Identify what can actually be changed, by whom, and on what timeline.
DISENGAGE	When no useful action remains, deliberately stop monitoring the issue for a defined period.

Summary

This sample shows a strongly structural, corrective, and system-focused response to Canadian politics. The person is likely to notice institutional weakness, inconsistency, and breakdown quickly. Their greatest strength is the ability to see where systems need repair. Their main growth edge is preventing correction energy from becoming chronic vigilance, over-control, or certainty beyond the available evidence.
